



Dorka Gryllus

graduated from the Budapest Academy of Drama and Film and joined the legendary Kaposvár Theater, where she played leading roles including Giacinta in Adventures in the Country (Goldoni), Ostrovsky's Forest and Dog in Family Stories (Serbljanovic), and musicals like Cabaret (Sally Bowles) with Hungary's most renowned stage directors. At the age of 22 she also starred in the film adaptation of an Eszterházy-novel entitled School of Senses.

After a minor role in Rolf Schübel's acclaimed film Gloomy Sunday, she decided to shift her focus from theatre to film and from Hungary to Germany, where she then starred in Schübel's Kollaps. She starred in Robert Pejo's Dallas Pashamende and was awarded Best Actress in Festroia 2005 (Portugal) and the Soci Festival (Russia), at the Hungarian Film Week 2005 and got the European Shooting Star Award 2005, Berlinale. Recent film work includes Irina Palm with Marianne Faithfull (Sam Garbarski), The Boneman (Wolfgang Murngerberg), The Camera-killer (Robert Pejo) and Soul Kitchen by Fatih Akin, as well as stage works at the Hebbel Theater, The Deutsches Theater in Berlin and PS122 in new York. She is also frontwoman of the Berlin-based band Rotfront.
